

REFLECTION FOR THE 24TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



"Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Matt. 18:21

Do I always forgive others? This is today's challenge from our readings. Or do I forgive some who offend me and not others? Am I a person who bears grudges? How do I deal with the person who harms me or hurts my feelings?

Only God can give us the grace to forgive all others, those who have harmed us in any way at all. God calls us to immediate and complete forgiveness of others. God is so clear in today's readings: if you do not forgive, how can you possibly ask forgiveness?

Today, we received a very clear message from the Lord God through the readings of the Holy Bible. We were told to forgive others of all their trespasses against us. And, our forgiveness should not be just once or twice, but seventy times seven. That does not mean that if we forgive every day for 490 days, then our share of forgiveness has been completed. The seventy times seven means ongoing forgiveness, day after day, week after week, years after years, this being done without counting.

When we do not forgive someone, it is because we are passing judgment on that person. Jesus commanded us not to judge others so that we will not be judged. For by the measure that we judge others, by refusing to forgive them of their trespasses, that same measure will be used against us when our time of judgment arrives. [Mt. 7:1-2]

So how can we perfectly forgive someone without judging? It is by completely forgetting the offenses that

by forgiving as a holy child of God, is asking for it or one is giving it. To His holiness, God promised, "None would rather gloss over our sins. Or of the sins that they have committed we deny them and blame somebody shall be remembered against them; else. they have done what is lawful and right, they shall surely live." (Ezek. 33:16) God shall no longer remember the sins of the sinner who does what is right. He forgives those who trespassed against Him without counting, without looking back, without ever mentioning the trespass again, as if it never happened. That is holy forgiveness.



Our Parish History

The First Mass in our parish was celebrated at the home of John Collopy, 6147 S. Mason Avenue on June 18, 1927. The first Sunday Masses were held at the Clearing Town Hall on Sunday, June 19, 1927 at 8am and 10am. Sunday Masses continued in this temporary location, attended by a body of 90 adult parishioners and their children. Weekday Masses were offered in a funeral home on the southeast corner of 63rd Place & Central Avenue.

THE HOLY MASS—Liturgy of the Eucharist

Our series continues as we walk through most of the actions and gestures at Mass. Together we will explore the meaning and origins of the Sacrament that is central to who we are as Catholics. We invite you to reflect on the liturgy and more specifically on the presence of God in our celebration at Mass.

The Litugy of the Eucharist follows another ancient Jewish tradition, the Passover Meal. In the Passover Meal prayers are said to remind the people of God's love and mercy, and where food is blessed and shared.

THE LORD'S PRAYER:

This is the prayer that unites ALL Christians, the prayer that Christ gave us. Before we share in the Bread of Life and Cup of Salvation, we recognize that our daily bread comes from God.

SIGN OF PEACE

In this ritual sharing of Christ's peace we use the first words of Jesus after the resurrection. 'Peace be with you'. Once we have received Christ's peace (not just a kind greeting) then we are prepared to recieve the fullness of Christ in the Eucharist.

Presider: The peace of the Lord be always with you.

All: And with your Spirit.

Presider: Let us offer each other a sign of peace.

COMMUNION RITE:

Once more, we enter a procession. All processions are outward, physical symbols of inward and spiritual realities. Each one of us, in our own faith lives, is on a procession. Our whole life is one great procession—one great journey—to Heaven and to the Father. So now, as we move forward to receive Holy Communion, we are more than simply 'in line'. We are in another procession which is a symbol of our pilgrimage to the Heavenly Banquet!

As we reach the priest or extraordinary minister, we are presented with the Eucharist in the very simplest of words: 'The Body of Christ'. The most awesome mystery, the very presence of Christ Jesus, given for our lives, and for the life of the world, demands a response from each one of us. And so we respond, 'Amen', another Hebrew word which means 'Yes' or 'So be it'.

Similarly, we are presented with the chalice with the words, 'The Blood of Christ', and again we respond with a strong 'Amen'.

The Eucharist the spiritual and sacramental nourishment for our life journey! As the Lord fed His chosen people with manna from heaven, so too does he feed us with this Bread from Heaven. As the two disciples in Emmaus recognized the presence of the Lord in the breaking of the bread, so too do we recognize the presence of Christ in our midst, feeding us with His very Body and Blood.

When all received Communion, the Priest prays a prayer of thanks, which brings the Liturgy of the Eucharist to a close.
