While human, he loved Jesus passionately and knew what Jesus would do for him. He saved him. Let's all pray for the same faith as Peter!

Perhaps we need to be like Peter and climb out of our comfort zone. In order to genuinely move forward, we must step out onto the stormy sea of unchartered territory and go to Jesus, trusting where he may lead us. Although it may be rough at times. he will lend a hand and in his time, lead us to the light of a new and brighter day.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The Roman Canon, called Eucharistic Prayer I, is probably seldom heard in your parish. Some priests will choose it for at least one of the Masses of Christmas, or the Easter Vigil. Such sparing use of this prayer seems strange, especially since it was the only Eucharistic Prayer in the Latin Rite for many centuries, from as long ago as 500 right up to 1970.

In 1965, the vernacular language was approved for the canon of the Mass. Almost immediately, some experimental texts began to surface in the Netherlands, and priests began to use new Dutch texts without permission. By 1966, Pope Paul VI had set up a committee to consider whether or not it was time to approve such experimentation and extend it to non-Dutch churches. No sooner had the committee been formed than other individuals copied the Dutch by just plunging on ahead. The Dutch bishops had approved the use of the new prayers nationwide in 1968, and Flemish bishops in Belgium quickly agreed. By then, German translations of the Dutch prayers were in wide use, and before long nearly one hundred Eucharistic Prayers, all unapproved, were in circulation in France.

The Vatican heard the widespread desire for more variety in Eucharistic Prayer forms, and, with the pope's approval, the process of creating new official prayers began.

THE HOLY MASS

In the coming weeks, we will walk through most of the actions and gestures at Mass and together we will explore the meaning and origins of the Sacrament that is central to who we are as Catholics. We invite you to reflect on the the liturgy and more specifically on the presence of God in our celebration at Mass.

INTRODUCTORY RIGHTS

This first part of the Mass is meant to gather all the individual people in the church into the Body of Christ. The rite takes each of us out of our individual thoughts and gathers us all into the prayer of the Church. It is a transition that gets us ready for the awesome mystery of the Eucharist where we can meet God and God meet us.

As we sing the Opening Song which helps to unify us as one voice, think about the prayer that you bring to church; a prayer for yourself and a prayer for our faith community. In the words of St. Augustine, "He who sings, prays twice!"

<u>VENERATION OF THE ALT</u>AR

As the priest approaches the Altar he bends forward in reverance and kisses it. This ritual goes back to the earliest followers of Jesus who were persecuted, even killed because their faith was contrary to that of the Romans. The early Christianswould gather in hidden places to pray and share their Eucharistic meal, often in underground catacombs, and the "table" they used was the coffin of one who was martyred. The gesture of kissing the burial site was one of reverence for those who gave their life for their faith. Many of our altars today contain relics of a saint, maintaining the tradition.

Another reason that the priest reverances the Altar with a kiss is because for us, the Altar—a table of sacrifice—is an image of Christ, who made the ultimate sacrifice, offering his very self to the Father.

Feast of the Assumption of our Blessed Mother

Since at least the 10th Century, it has been customary in the Western Church for the priest to bless herbs on the Solemnity of the Assumption. The Eastern Church likely had a similar formulary much earlier. In many places the faithful had all their flowers blessed, especially those closely associated with the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is meant to remind all of us of the gifts God has given us for our sustenance, healing and beauty.

Holy Tradition educates us that all the Apostles, except St. Thomas who was late, were transported mystically to Jerusalem in order to be with the Mother of God – the Theotokos – as she reposed, and to give her a burial. When Thomas arrived the next day, the Apostles opened the tomb so that he could kiss Mary farewell. The opened tomb revealed that the body of the Holy Virgin Mother of God was missing, and filled with herbs and flowers. This event was a sure sign of her great purity and holiness.

Throughout the world, it was (and is still) traditional to celebrate the Feast of the Assumption by bringing the summer harvest to be blessed. The first fruits — herbs, tomatoes, summer squash, etc. — are often associated with the Feast of the Assumption both because of the time of year and because Mary was the first believer in Jesus to experience the promised resurrection. She is the first fruit of a great coming harvest.

Tuesday, August 15th is a Holy Day of Obligation. At all masses that day, we will conclude with a Blessing of Flowers, Fruits and Herbs. We encourage you to bring items from your garden to be blessed during this celebration. If you do not have a garden, we encourage you to participate by bringing flowers, spices, herbs or fruit.
