

Welcome to Two Holy Martyrs Parish!!

St. Symphorosa & St. Rene Goupil

Blessed is the fruit of your womb.

These are the words spoken by Elizabeth to Mary in our Gospel for the Fourth Sunday Advent. These are words we say every time we pray the Hail Mary. We are acknowledging that the life inside this young Jewish girl is the Holy One of God.

Take time in these days before the celebration to ponder the great mystery of the Incarnation; that God would humble himself and take on human flesh. God has chosen Mary to play an important role in salvation history. She becomes the vessel by which the divine becomes human while remaining fully divine.

God touches our humanity to restore what has been lost. The great St. Athanasius wrote, "For the Lord touched all parts of creation, and freed and undeceived them all from every deceit."

God first touches Mary in her immaculate being; made so by God, who took a sinless entry into our sinful world. Sinful man needed a savior outside of itself, and that Savior came from eternity into our broken humanity. Infinity dwindles to infancy.

We as human beings run the risk of forgetting the WHY of salvation. We slip into arrogancy as we plot and plan a perfect world devoid of God. We stubbornly stick our sinful heads into the proverbial sand and echo the title of a 1960s self-help book – I'm okay, you're okay.

No, we're not okay. We're actually pretty messed up. The mess started as soon as our first parents made a choice to sin. The fracture ripples through time and space, but the One not bound by time and space would enter into time and space to begin the restoration project we call salvation history.

The season of Advent and Christmas reminds us not only of the WHY, but also the WHO.

Why? We lost sanctifying grace. We lost original innocence. We lost union with God.

Who? Jesus comes to heal the wound. He comes to serve as Mediator between heaven and earth. He is the way, and the truth, and the life. The Word becomes flesh and dwells among us.

Mary teaches us how to be receptive to God. She teaches us how to let go of what gets in the way of God's giving, and plenty of things can become obstacles to fully receiving from the Lord. Use these final days of Advent to clean the plate of distraction, division, deceit, and diversion. Ask for the heart of Mary, who humbly accepts what the Lord desires to give.

Think about this. Every time you worthily receive Holy Communion, you imitate the Blessed Mother in bearing, in your very physical being, the person of Jesus. And just like Mary, we go in haste; out into the world to share the Good News. God has come to us in a very intimate way.

Realizing God's love for us, we then make the intentional choice to LIVE FOR GOD.

Advent Reconciliation Service

The Two Holy Martyrs Parish Advent Reconciliation Service will take place tomorrow (Dec. 20) at 7 PM in our St. Rene church.

There will be a brief Liturgy of the Word, including a reflection by one of our priests. There will then be opportunity for one-on-one confession with individual absolution.

If you know you are carrying around serious sin (mortal sin) please know that Jesus wants to take it away from you, so that sanctifying grace can once again flow through you, and you can be freed up. This is truly a great way to prepare for the gift of Christmas.

The sacrament of Reconciliation is a healing sacrament, along with Anointing of the Sick. Jesus is a healer. Sin wounds us. Grace heals us. Come ask for God's mercy.

Do I Have To?

This year Christmas falls on a Saturday, and the day after Saturday is ... Sunday.

"Fr. Bob, does this mean I have to go to Mass two days in a row?"

Ahhh! Interesting question. For starters, we don't have to do anything. Even if Mother Church gives us "helps" toward salvation (Sunday obligation), we can always opt out. Love does not coerce. It helps us when we begin to see Holy Mass not as a burden, but a blessing.

Our language can change from "I have to" into "I get to." The Holy Spirit can help us see our participation in Mass as something that elevates our humanity and prepares us for the Eternal Banquet.

For perspective, there have been times I have played golf two days in a row without missing a beat. I am sure some of us have gone shopping two days in a row. Movie aficionados go to the theater two days in a row. You get the picture.

Spend time on this quote by Padre Pio:

"Renew your faith by attending Holy Mass. Keep your mind focused on the mystery that is unfolding before your eyes. In your mind's eye transport yourself to Calvary and meditate on the victim who offers

Himself to Divine Justice, paying the price of your redemption."

We don't have to go to Mass. We get to go to Mass. Thank God!



(Matthew 28:20

Arriving at this Fourth Sunday of Advent, we begin to hear some of the prayers and readings, notably the Gospel Reading, which more explicitly connect us with our Lord's birth. The Visitation, the meeting of the Blessed Virgin and St. Elizabeth, literally tells of St. John the Baptist and our Lord alive in the wombs of their respective mothers. However, as much as these readings and images might sound familiar and stir excitement for the approach of Christmas Day, pausing with the other readings for this Sunday allows us to learn more about who Jesus is and hopefully, to know, love and serve Him all the better.

The First Reading is another prophetic text, which prepares the world for our Lord and reveals more of who He will be. The Prophet Micah's book, seven chapters long, is much shorter than the Book of the Prophet Isaiah,

sixty-six chapters long, and in the cycles of readings for the Sunday Masses and the daily Masses, we do not hear from Micah as frequently as we do Isaiah. What St. Micah tells us, "You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah too small to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel; whose origin is from of old, from ancient times. ... He shall stand firm and shepherd his flock by the strength of the LORD, in the majestic name of the LORD, his God; and they shall remain, for now his greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth; he shall be peace." (Micah 5:1, 3-4) Without using the name, "Jesus," or the word, "Messiah," this "one," sounds impressive. We are told that this forthcoming person will be marked with the following attributes: come from the people of Bethlehem-Ephrathah; will be for God; will be the "ruler in Israel," (Micah 5:1); will be of ancient origin; will display fortitude as He shepherds "his flock" (Micah 5:3); that He will do so by "the strength of the Lord" (Micah 5:3) and in the "name of the Lord, his God" (Micah 5:3); that His impact will extend through all of the earth; and finally, "he shall be peace." (Micah 5:4) This is a laudable list for whomever it will apply.

From this literal sense of the First Reading, we have some material from which the allegorical sense of this reading, the sense pertaining to our faith as it is fulfilled by God, becomes recognizable. For us, with a Catholic understanding of the Old Testament, we can focus on a prophecy, such as Micah's, and can see that this foretold figure will be Jesus. As we will hear in the Gospel Readings of Jesus' Nativity, He will be born in Bethlehem and that He will be for God, both by His conception by the Holy Spirit and in doing God the Father's will. Being God the Son, Jesus has always existed with the Father and the Holy Spirit, which means that He is consistent with Micah's prophecy of coming from ancient origin. Jesus, during His public preaching, will speak of His being the Good Shepherd (John 10:11, 14) and will act in the name of the Father, doing His will. (John 6:38, 39) Certainly, Jesus will display immense fortitude as He ministers in the face of hostility and ultimately will offer His life freely on the Cross. (John 10:18) That Jesus will be peace is fulfilled as He speaks to the Apostles during the Last Supper and offer His peace to them. (John 14:27) Being the ruler of Israel will be one of the most challenging statements for people to receive as that part of Micah's prophecy seems to have been interpreted literally, that a new earthly ruler would emerge and free Israel from foreign rule. Jesus will not rule in that way but instead become King of Heaven and Earth by His victory over sin and death. What we hear in the Second Reading for this Sunday, from the Letter to the Hebrews, will be an example of New Testament writing, which professes that Jesus has fulfilled some of these prophecies, notably, to fulfilling of the Father's will and His fortitudinous and selfless sacrifice.

The moral sense of this First Reading is not as developed as the allegorical sense; still, the "one," about whom St. Micah prophesies, will "stand firm and shepherd his flock by the strength of the LORD." (Micah 5:3) Standing firm, practicing fortitude as a shepherd, this is an exercise of virtue. Being the Good Shepherd to His flock, Jesus will act in a long-suffering way, with charity, selfless love. Additionally, being "peace," (Micah 5:4) not only is a gift from our Lord of Himself, He will commend the peacemakers in the Beatitudes. (Matthew 5:9) How is one to be a peacemaker without first being filled with God's peace?

In the fourth sense of the Prophet Micah's writing, the anagogical sense, from which we might learn how God is leading us to Heaven, we might return to that description of the "one" being "ruler in Israel." As with the allegorical sense of that characteristic, Jesus does not literally fulfill that prophecy; He does not ascend any earthly throne or lead any rebellion. His kingdom, as Jesus answers Pontius Pilate, "does not belong to this world." (John 18:36) Therefore, if Jesus' kingdom does not belong to this world and yet He is to rule Israel, He must accomplish that prophecy in another way, which points us toward the universal and cosmic rule He will exercise over sin and death.

What else in this First Reading or in the other readings, whether for this Sunday or in your own time reading or hearing the word of God recently have you noticed? Is one of the four senses of Scripture attracting you more at this time and might you remain with that sense as we celebrate Christmas?



Comfort and Salvation

All of today's scriptures seem to declare Christmas's "comfort and joy." Micah declares that, as small as Bethlehem is, the child born there will bring peace that "shall reach to the ends of the earth." Hebrews proclaims that, despite pain and suffering, the "offering of the body of Jesus Christ" saves us all.

In today's Gospel, bearing the Christ Child within her, Mary, barely more than a child herself, immediately, unselfishly sets aside her own preoccupations -- and as a betrothed but as yet unmarried mother-to-be, how many they must have been -- to travel in haste, over dangerous terrain, a four - day journey (the scholars say) from Nazareth to Ain - Karem, to the home of Elizabeth and Zechariah.

Then, just as David leapt and danced before the ancient Ark of the Covenant that bore precious signs of God's abiding presence, so John leaps in his mother Elizabeth's womb, as Mary arrives, a living ark bearing God's living presence. Elizabeth joyfully greets Mary in words that w pray daily in the "Hail Mary": "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb." Why Mary is so "blessed" Elizabeth then explains: "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled." Likewise, we may dare hope to be "blessed" for "believing that what was spoken" to us "by the Lord" -- Jesus' promise of mercy -- will be fulfilled as we share God's mercy with everyone. For by reason of our baptism and, more immediately and repeatedly, because of our participation in the Eucharist, we too bear within ourselves the living Christ. To whom, or to what situation, do we need to bear Christ this Christmas? Indeed, through the year, how selflessly do we set our own concerns aside? How eagerly -- "in haste" -- do we, disregarding difficulties, traverse whatever dangerous terrain needs conquering to be of service to another?




